Dear Colleagues,

The 'Archives and Communities' Conference is shaping up to be a landmark event. Beyond the unique coming together of the Australian and New Zealand archives communities, the theme has obviously resonated strongly. The importance of communities as a concept for our professional discourse is evident. Records and archives are important contributors to identity and therefore underpin the very concept of community. The diversity of modern society challenges us to engage with a range of different communities. I hope you will join us in exploring these issues.

A strong response to the call for papers has enabled us to put together a rich programme. Plenary sessions from international speakers Ian Wilson, Richard Cox, and Terry Eastwood will present fresh perspectives from some of the leading figures in the recordkeeping world.

- how we mobilise other communities on our behalf; and
- the impact of information technology on our traditional communities of practice.

I am sure that as each of you explores the programme you will find sessions of interest, relevance and challenge.

A successful conference achieves a sense of community among delegates, and a sense of belonging to a broader professional community that lasts well after the conference dinner is over. As well as the main conference sessions, there is a range of professional and social activities throughout the week. I encourage you all to take the fullest advantage of the opportunities presented by this conference.

On behalf of the Conference Committee I look forward to welcoming you to Wellington!

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RICHARD J COX

Richard Cox is a Professor in Library and Information Science at the University of Pittsburgh, School of Information Sciences where he is responsible for the archives and records management concentration in the MLIS degree.

He chaired the Society of American Archivists (SAA) committee which drafted new graduate archival education guidelines adopted by its Council in 1988, served for four years as a member of that association's Committee on Education and Professional Development, and was a member of the Society's governing Council from 1986 through 1989.

Dr. Cox served as Editor of the *American Archivist* from 1991 through 1995, and he is currently editor of the *Records & Information Management Journal* published by M.E. Sharpe and the publications editor for the Society of American Archivists. He has written and published extensively on archival and records management professional issues, and been the recipient of a number of awards.



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TERRY EASTWOOD

Terry Eastwood joined the School of Library, Archives and Information Studies at the University of British Columbia in Canada as the first professor to teach in the Master of Archival Studies Program, and acted as the chair of the program from 1981 until the end of June 2000.

He is a Past President of the Association of Canadian Archivists and editor of its journal, a Fellow of the Society of American Archivists and past member of its Council. From 1991-1995, he was a member of the Planning Committee on Descriptive Standards of the Bureau of Canadian Archivists which developed the Canadian Rules for Archival Description.

Professor Eastwood has written on many archival subjects. For the past seven years, his research has concentrated on electronic records. He took part in a project investigating the integrity of active electronic records conducted in collaboration with the US Department of Defense. He was a co-investigator in the InterPARES project investigating the long-term preservation of electronic records.



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JENNY JAKOBS

Jenny has worked for the last six years as a lecturer in the School of Sociology, Social Policy and Social Work at Massey University Wellington. She has had a special interest in community development as she worked for twenty years in the non-governmental sector carrying out community development projects, especially in the interests of parents. In this capacity, she worked on a basic developmental model of awareness, analysis and action, and experienced the joys and frustrations of linking groups with a common interest and supporting them to initiate changes that would enhance their community of interest. In her teaching she now incorporates the Structural Analysis model of community development. Jenny now teaches Community Development to year three students in the Social Work or the Humanities degrees. Underpinning her work is a theoretical position of feminism and critical theory and a belief in collective action enhancing communities' well-being.



IAN WILSON

In May 2004, Ian Wilson was appointed Librarian and Archivist of Canada in the new Library and Archives Canada. He had been appointed National Archivist of Canada in July 1999 and, with the National Librarian, developed and led the process to create a new knowledge institution for Canada in the 21st century.

In 2001, Ian was awarded an Honorary Doctorate of Letters (D. Litt.) from York University in recognition of his contribution to Canadian archives. He serves on the Information Management Sub-Committee of the Treasury Board of Canada and was appointed their Information Management co-Champion for the Government of Canada in 2002. In 2000 he was elected Vice-President of the International Council on Archives.

Ian has taught as an Adjunct Professor in the Faculties of Information Studies and Graduate Studies of the University of Toronto. He has also published extensively on history, archives, heritage, and information management and lectured both nationally and abroad.
